WARBURTON PLAYS A DETERMINED ROLE
AT RIGHT BACK. RAYNARD HITS FINE
GOALS.

Institute took the lead when Yarwood sent over a deadly centre and a deflection saw the ball in the back of the net. I reckon this goal should be given to Yarwood who had created all the danger.

Beatle now came into the play when he broke down a dangerous attack with a fine well timed tackle. More havoc from Yarwood on the left and then again play swung back into our goalmouth and Swinnerton saved his team with a good interception and accurate clearance.

Swinnerton was looking very solid in the middle of the defence and from one of his long kicks Yarwood was completely clear. He was brought down in the area and I thought a penalty would have been a just award in these circumstances. Yarwood would certainly have scored about that there is little doubt. The incident was 'levelled' out when a minute later Swinnerton looked to handle the ball in the area but he was lucky to be 'blindsided' of the ref. Partington again played a superb ball to Chin who ran so very well with the ball. He was denied by a great save by the opposition goalie.

3rd year continued.

SEMI FINAL DEFEAT BRINGS AN ERA ALMOST TO AN END.
HOWEVER A FINE SECOND HALF PERFORMANCE EASES THE 'PAIN'
OF DEFEAT.

We had a longish delay on the touchline waiting for the ref. to turn up and when he did he had only to take off his dinner jacket and unclip his bike clips to take up duties.

Mr Mockler took up his lonely stance on the far distant touchline almost a light year away from the game whilst Zooke, Mr. Flanagan Snr. Tony Jones Snr. and Mr Carter with the Eyo's Snr. and others kept a close watch on what was going on. They were shortly to be joined by Mr Williams, Lea and Day and later by George and his dog to make up a truly huge crowd.

The game kicked off and the action started. Ian Barker was first to shine when he made a great interception and brought the ball away from danger.

Roy Dudley was having a trying time at left back and in the first ten minutes he was given a 'roasting' by the away winger. Galvin saved the day on one occasion with a superb save from a dangerous cross.

Victor Jones was awfully quiet on the line, obviously tired after his world heavyweight bout with the rest of 5A that afternoon.

Brian Flanagan shot just wide from 15 yards and this was followed by some really determined play by Tony Jones.

After about ten minutes we went a goal behind when Ian Barker made an untypical slip and their striker made the most of his half chance. Disaster followed when a long centre was not challenged and they had a free header. Galvin had no chance, being badly let down by his defence.

Lintott was having as bad a time as Dudley and his tackling and marking left much to be desired. Unlike Dudley our right back could not take it and after 15 minutes he sulked off and was lost to the universe. Quite the opposite, Roy Dudley showed real character and for the remainder of the game he played very well indeed, overcoming a bad start by means of hard tackling and gutsy play.

Bailey replaced Lintott and proved a very competent defender.

The game now went through a kick it anywhere session by both sides before the goals again came. Barker lost out on a challenge and a good shot saw us 0.3 down.

One of our failings was an inability to think fast enough. On one occasion Flanagan had the ball at his feet with Lewis clear to his left and just far enough forward to be able to pose a real threat.

Brian delayed his pass and Lewis was by then caught offside.

Tony Jones was the only player really competing but this is his style in all the games I have seen him play in.

We went 0.4 down when a lack of cover in the centre allowed them to shoot from 20 yards. Galvin again had no chance with this shot and was again let down by the defence.

Immediately after this Flanagan and Eyo broke clear and one of them should have burst the back of the net. What happened was that the goalie made a comfortable save from Flanagan when with a little bit of 'legal evil' I am sure we would have scored. By this I mean a bit of the killer touch, a real determination to bury the ball into the back of the net come what may. We don't seem to have this knack of heaping real misery on opposition defences.

Just before half time Galvin was kicked in the head and the ref only just decided that it was not really fair play. Three of our defenders took the opportunity of wiping off all the fingerprints and footmarks off their backs.

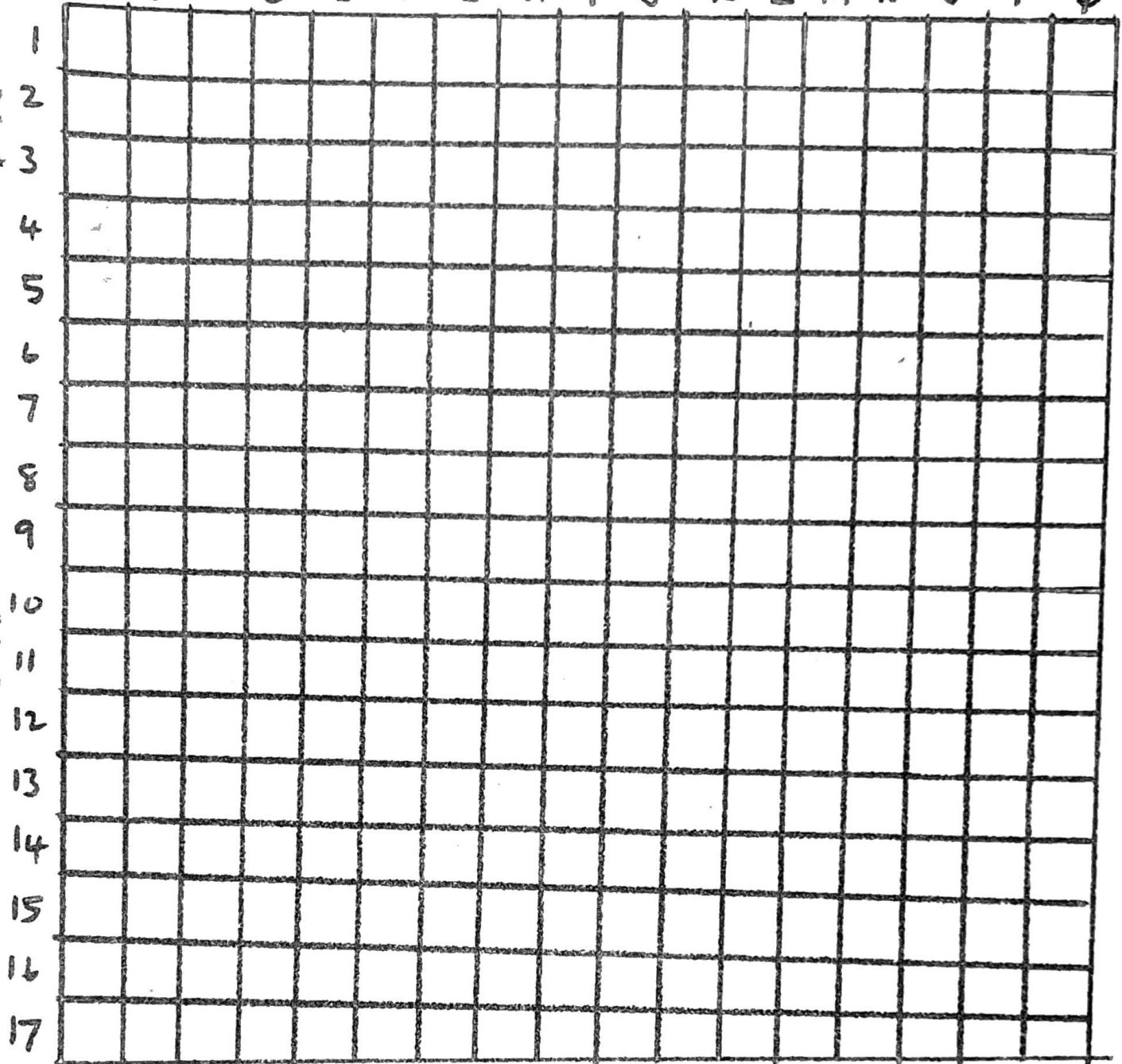
