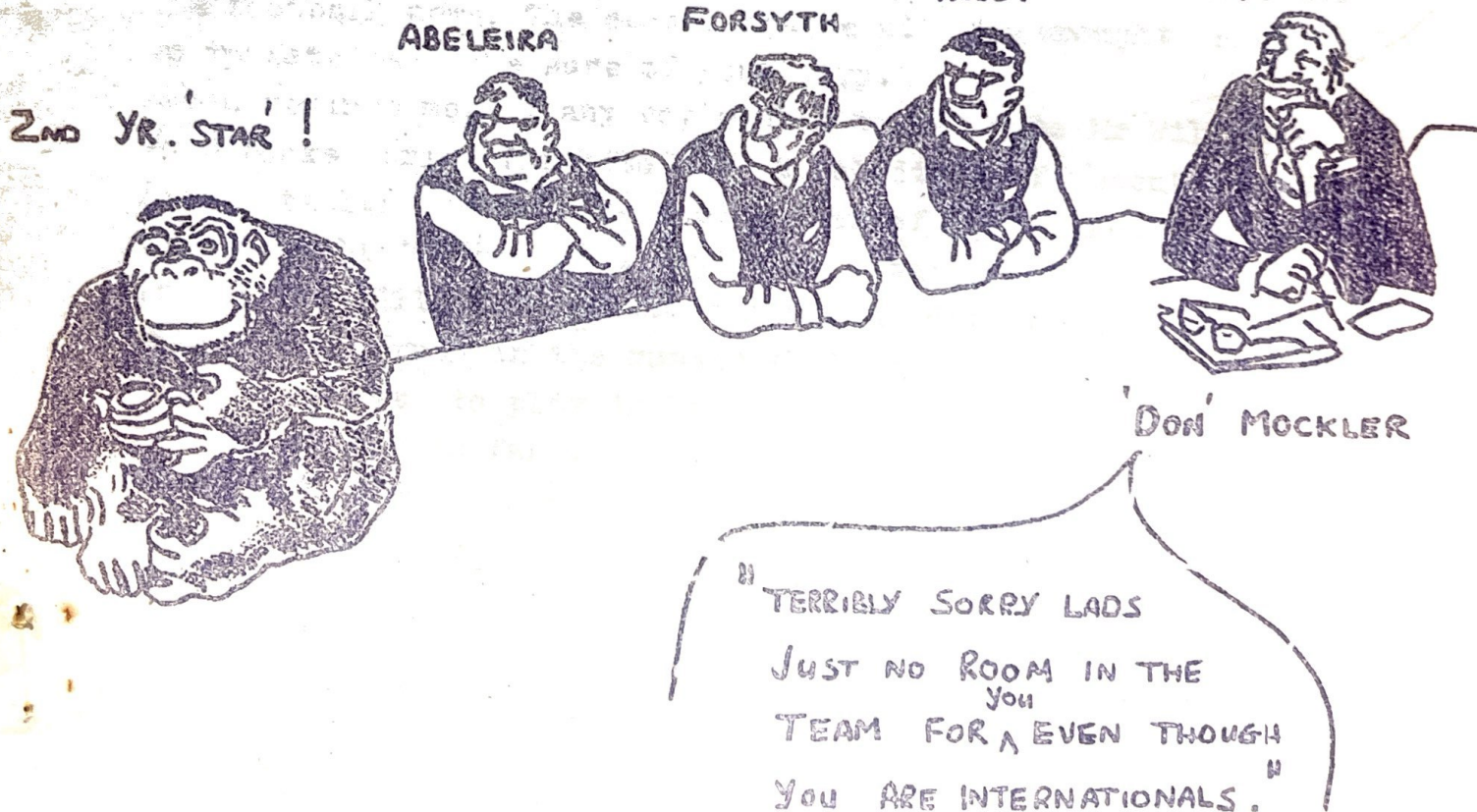

Match reports follow.

The conditions were perfect for this our opening game in Belgium. I doubt if there was a lot of difference between the two teams but right from the start Liverpool brought into play their 'secret' weapon. This was all out enthusiasm, energy and drive. With this we 'swamped' the opposition. They never had a moments let up. Unfortunately late nights maybe and a general tiredness meant we could only keep this up for three sessions. It was all okay in this game but by the second half of the second game we had shot our bolt and from then on the job was much more difficult.

Institute were straight into the attack. Abeleira came so close to scoring and Dean Mullin had two golden chances that he let slip by. Tony Forsyth also should have scored in the opening 15 minutes. I was worrying that so much pressure and no goals to show for it might 'backfire' on the team later in the game.

My fears were further raised when Lee Stanley sent in a thundering twenty yarder that 'smacked' against the crossbar and bounced down to safety. Stanley was running all over the park and putting in a tremendous amount of work and with Burns and Ross looking really sound in the middle of the defence the main worry was just how to score a goal.

It came at last after 25 minutes when Tony Forsyth had a real piece of luck and the ball fell kindly for him. Seconds later it was in the back of the net. But this was no game on which a one goal lead would be comfortable. We needed more but they were not forthcoming. It was now the remainder of the side that ensured victory as the forwards slowly faded from the action. Fox in midfield was having a fine game, tackling well and distributing the ball to his team mates with real accuracy. Also in midfield Holden looked to be in fine fettle. But the player who stood out most in the defence was Kenny Fellows. Possibly we might have expected a fast winger to make something of this defensive flank of ours but this certainly never happened. Kenny cleared his lines time after time with great, effective long kicks upfield.

Lamkin was his usual confident self and Melia did nothing wrong between the 'sticks'.

Liverpool held out and fully deserved their narrow win. Cookie was really chuffed as the final whistle was blown.

Liverpool carried on the all out 'swamping' of the opposition in the early moments of this game. We had once again many chances to score goals but failed to make the vital conversion. Mullin had a fierce free kick saved brilliantly and Forsyth and Abeleira again posed many threats to the Twyford defense. It was in this period that Ross began his complete dominance in the Institute team. He appeared everywhere. In attack then back to defence and then he was winning the midfield ball and sending away his forwards once again. Ross is indeed three players in one when in this mood.

Burns continued to look more and more composed and he did the right thing cleanly without fuss many times in defence. These two must have disheartened the Twyford forwards over and again as they broke up attacks. And of course as always Lamkin had the flank completely under control.

At half time it was looking good for Institute but unknown to me they had shot their bolt as a striking force. The forwards again disappeared from the game and Lee Stanley lost a little of his midfield grip as he became more involved in a running battle with a Twyford player. Stanley maybe a small player but he certainly is a hard player. He crunched the opposition a few times but this did seem to affect the rest of the team somewhat. I have noticed that when Stanley fades a little the team usually slip back considerably. But today we discovered another star in Keith Holden. He now took over the middle of the pitch with a display of real competency. It was this vital stage that won him the man of the match award. Fellows once again played so well and somehow Institute hung on to their precious lead. (I 've just remembered I have not mentioned our first half goal scored by Mullin. It was a slightly fortunate effort but Mullin took it well and what an important goal it was.)

As the end of the game approached I was frantic to hear the whistle. If the game had gone on another 5 minutes I feel we may have lost. Melia was a tower of strength in goal but the whole tournament was saved for us by a last minute goal line clearance by Lamkin. Tension and scrambles and shouts from a drained Zooke before the final whistle and two beautiful points. A mention for Simon Black who had worked so very hard in midfield. For enthusiasm and real effort i could not rate him higher. And in fact on one second half occasion he took the ball away from their most dangerous forward when just for once we were stretched at the back after a long forward surge by Rossy.

After 5 minutes we took the lead when Mullin played a brilliant dummy in front of goal and the ball came out to Ross. He sent in a scorcher of a shot that was saved brilliantly but the ball bounced loose to Abeleira who crashed it home with glee.

Lee Stanley pulled off a fine interception and this was followed by a thirty yarder from Ross that the goalie was pushed to save. Ross now turned up in defence when he saved his team from conceding a goal.

Fox made an important interception to relieve the pressure and in these early moments Mullin was playing very well although he faded as the game progressed. Mullin and Stanley combined well and a good cross saw the goalie make a right old blunder. Abeleira was there to 'cash in' and score goal number two.

Now it all went wrong.

This goal inspired Sion Hill and although we did not then know it we had shot our bolt. Abeleira, Forsyth and Mullin faded from the action, Fellows found his opponent a real problem and Fox and Black were under real pressure in midfield. This left our back three really stretched. For 10 minutes now we were taken apart as Sion scored two fine fast break goals. Holden was brought on for Fox just before half time.

A real telling off seemed to give Institute some new energy and in the second half we looked more like holding out, though it seemed a rare possibility that we could regain our lead.

Holden immediately looked impressive in midfield and Burns played some great football in the heart of the defence. Melia made his main contribution at this stage by pulling off three super saves. One of them was a really brave effort when all seemed lost.

James Yan replaced Simon Black and twice he made good interceptions to relieve pressure. However it still came and Melia now pulled off a miracle save before Holden made a vital tackle to save the day. But with ten minutes to go we suffered a real set back when Melia was badly injured diving at the feet of an advancing striker.

Melia sustained a bad cut on his knee but he decided to continue. It was this injury that allowed Sion to score the winner. However to be fair they did deserve this goal. Our defence was outstipped for speed and with Melia confined to his line the goal was scored.

In the last minute we could easily have equalised as our hibernating forwards came to life. Forsyth got close to goal but did not convert.
