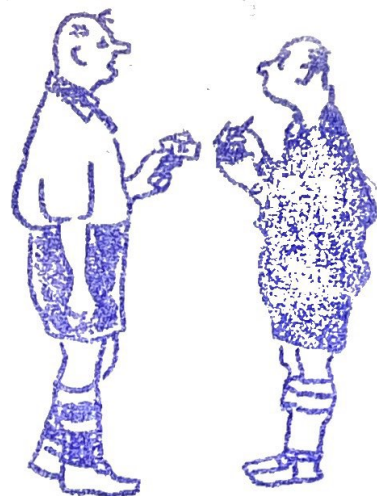
MR. COOKE'S TOTTINGS.

Just at the moment I am very busy trying to get everything done by the end of term and collecting together all the articles for the Bumper Xmas edition that will be ready Monday December 20th. It is still not too late for you to hand in a contribution. Think about it. Put pen to paper. By you Six or Sixty the FOOTBALL NEWS is ready to print your news, views etc.

I have to report that the typewriter I acquired was a 'pig in a poke'. It does not type on the stencils I use, at least not in a clear enough way. So I am once again working by hand. I hope you can all read my writing.

MR. COOKE has another useless contribution to his huge pile of artefacts.

One day about seven years ago I was climbing in the Lake District. One morning the weather was very bad but I decided to take a chance and set off to gain Striding Edge which leads to the summit of Helvellyn 3118 ft. The weather settled as the morning passed but a thick mist descended and the air was damp and uncomfortable. Striding Edge can be very crowded with many climbers but on this occasion, I had the ridge to myself. The summit of Helvellyn is a vast flat plateau with sharp ridges and steep slopes to the east and gentle slopes to the west. On gaining the summit I was turned away from the environs of the cairn because many people were sheltering there from the damp and cold. I wandered away to the north to the edge of a steep slope that descended to Kepplecove. I stood there alone for about half an hour when I experienced something I shall never forget. I saw a gigantic shadow in the mist, suspended over the deep chasm. It was something of an illusion because on closer study the shadow was quite close and of actual size. It was in my own eyes, my shadow for on moving the image moved also. This of course was a Brocken spectre. This phenomenon is confined to hill country and can be observed by a climber on a ridge enclosing a combe filled with mist. These shadows seen 'on the mist' were first viewed on the Brocken in Germany, hence the name. The experience lasted 3 minutes and after it had lapsed I noticed I was not alone. An elderly man had been sitting on the edge of the drop and he approached me. He too had seen the spectre. (In actual fact it is usually only possible for each climber to see his own spectre) He told me he had been climbing for 50 years and never experienced a Brocken Spectre. I felt lucky that I had the fortune to experience the phenomenon almost by accident whilst this gentleman had known about it and almost been seeking it for many years. I remained on the summit for many hours but conditions did not allow a repeat. Although I have spent many hours in the hills since that day no repeat has come my way. I recommend anyone to seek the solitude and peace that hill regions can offer. As long as you 'watch where you are putting your feet' you will gain rich rewards. Of course sometimes you get wet - it never stops raining. That's all for now see you in Number 35.

Once again the lads were inspired by Cup fever to give an outstanding performance, and all the spectators, reinforced by Messrs. Lea, Mockler and Owen, must have enjoyed the skillful football served up by Institute. Croxteth were not easy opponents, being rather a physical side, especially their back four, and so this crushing victory was extremely satisfying.

Institute got off to the perfect start when, after several promising attacks, Manifold found himself totally unmarked from a cross and calmly opened the score from about 8 yards out. He also scored the second when he picked up a clearance on the edge of the area, and sent a low shot through a crowd of players just inside the post - two examples of sharp finishing. Institute were applying constant pressure, especially down the wings, and Lawlor almost slipped in a good header from a measured cross by Holden. Connelly also fired just wide from a volley. It fell to Mitchell to score the third when the keeper let a shot slip out of his hands momentarily and Mitchell showed his exceptional sharpness by pushing it over the line. The defence were in their usual commanding form and Wiggins hardly touched the ball. Indeed it was a surge through by Jarman which led to the third goal.

Croxteth switched to 4-2-4 in the second half and this caused a few problems, but it was Institute who should have opened the scoring in the second half when Woods slipped through the defence and was about to put the ball in the net when he was brought down from behind. However, Manifold's penalty was saved. Then Croxteth scored from a simple header. But Mitchell soon showed us all of his skills when he picked up the ball outside the area, went past two defenders and shot into the top corner. Croxteth then scored a second with the defence stupidly sticking their arms in the air claiming off-side - they must learn to play the whistle at all times. But that was the last of Croxteth. Lawlor was causing all sorts of trouble and was crudely brought down just outside the box. From the free-kick, a goal-mouth scramble resulted and Woods claimed to have forced it over the line. Lawlor then slipped the defence and had a shot well saved; Woods ran through well but hit his shot at the keeper; Jarman stormed through from the half-way line, passed, received it back and sent in a good shot. Then Connelly was rewarded by the sixth goal for all the clever running he had done on the left. The final goal fell to Woods and what a good goal it was. Harper won the ball on the half-way line, powered his way through and sent a good pass into the path of Woods who calmly lobbed the advancing keeper.

This was one of our best performances ever, with sound defence, sharp finishing and outstanding midfield play. Derbyshire proved a steady replacement for Virtue, but it was Mitchell and Manifold who linked so well, with several clever one-twos and defence-splitting passes. Lawlor and Connelly received the ball regularly from midfield, adding width to the attack and stretching the defence. Woods looked very sharp and looks destined to score many goals. Foulkes was slightly hesitant in the tackle, but looked solid; Holden made one memorable tackle with three of their forwards converging on Wiggins, and sent some excellent balls to Lawlor. Harper blocked the middle in his usual efficient manner and sweeper Jarman picked up any balls which got through, as well as showing us a couple of his attacking burats forward.

2ND XI'S LACK OF FIGHT LEADS TO DISAPPOINTING DRAW

The 2nd XI again failed to capitalise on a good first half display. The early part of the half was a dour midfield struggle, but the Institute did manage to win a couple of corners. After 15 minutes a good left foot shot by Wheeler struck the post, a few minutes later Maricourt gained their first corner. From an Institute corner though, Long had a shot which also hit the post. At this stage Institute were looking good, with Cottrell looking particularly good in defence. Roche scored after half an hour with a fine left foot shot into the top left hand corner of the Maricourt net. Institute began to find it hard to keep their feet on the slippery surface, and Maricourt used the long-through ball, but were foiled mostly by fine saves from Wilkinson.
