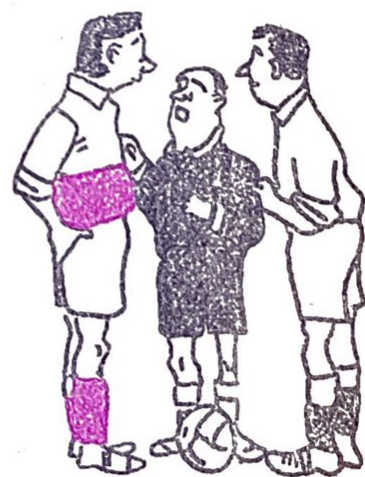

PETTIGREW HITS THREE IN GOOD WIN
