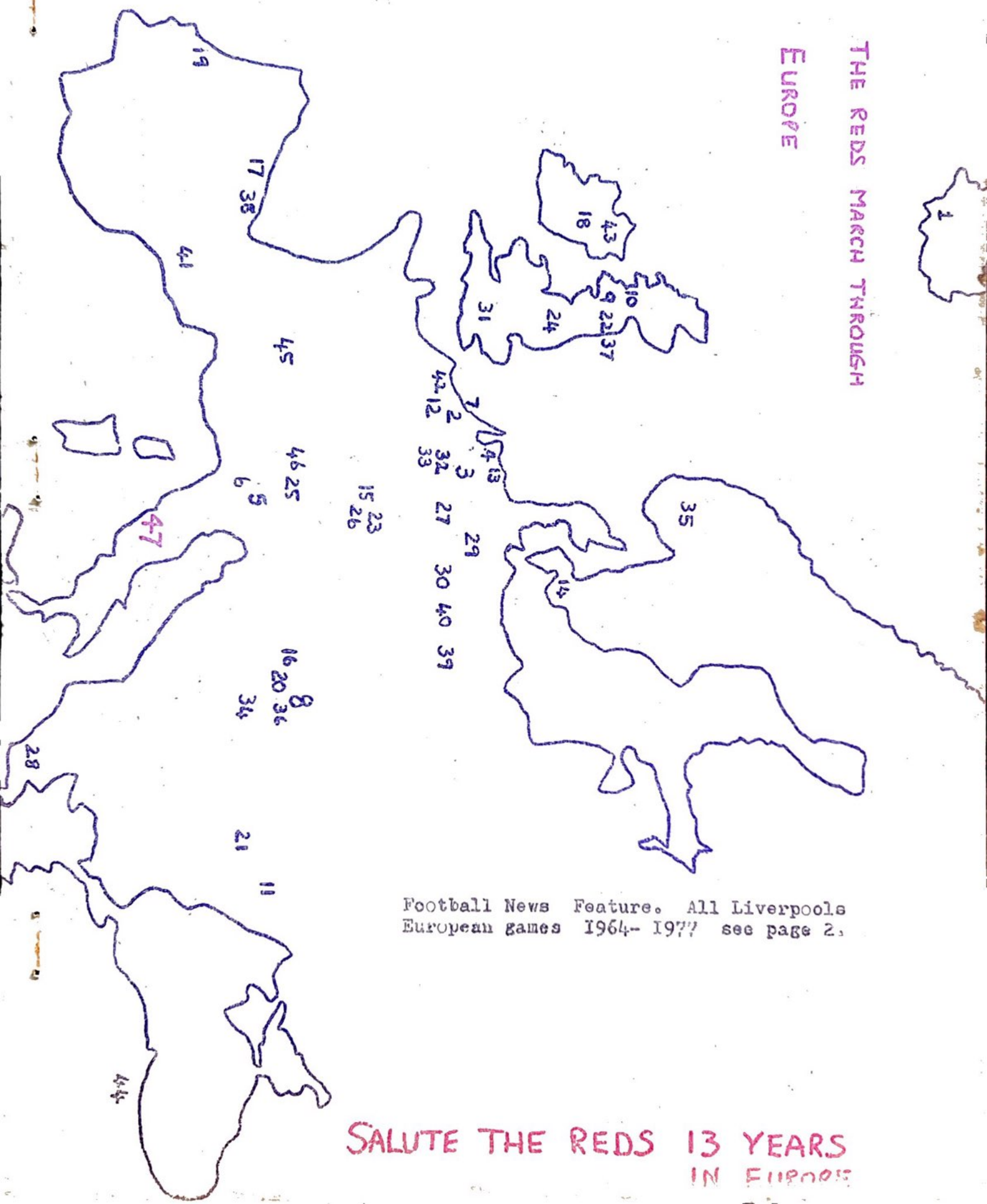

Casting my mind back I can remember many of Liverpools early games in Europe. The first one of course was in Iceland. Recently I went climbing in Iceland and when passing through Reykjavik, camped on a field next to the stadium, where the road to Rome began thirteen years ago. Many of you will not realise that Liverpool should have appeared in the final in that first memorable season. In the semi final, just days after winning the F.A. Cup, Liverpool played Inter Milan. This was, without doubt, the greatest game I have ever seen Liverpool play. They outclassed Milan and a 3-1 victory was not a true reflection of their supremacy. The second leg in Milan was a disgrace. The fans declared war on Liverpool. Cars outside their hotel made sure the Liverpool team got little sleep the night before the game. Eytier playing tunes on their hooters caused this. I think a blindfolded frog could have refereed the game better. Liverpool went down 0-3 and lost the semi final 3-4. Ask anyone about the Inter Milan semi final and I am sure you will find they will agree with my unbiased comments. I can remember risking a court martial on the night we were defeated in the Cup winners Cup, the following year. Struck in a hole in the ground on Salisbury Plain I was partaking in an exercise with a tank regiment. I returned the radio from the Army command circuit to take in the commentary from Glasgow. One of the Funniest things I have ever seen at a Football ground happened on the Kop. One particular game was notable for some awful play by a player whose name eludes me. He continually missed open goals and the comments from the crowd became more and more insulting. He was likened to a man with serious physical handicaps most of it in a humorous manner. After one astonishing miss the Kop was hushed. Then a roar from someone behind the goal was followed by a swishing sound and the thud of a missile landing in the goalmouth. You'll never guess what it was. It was a crutch. A real pukka* crutch. What it was doing on the Kop I certainly don't know. I had a good look round after the game for a 'limping Long John Silver' or a redundant parrot but for me that moment was magic. Imagine how the player must have felt. Actually his play was so bad he would have fitted well into the Everton Forward line. No I must be good and refrain from knocking Everton.

I should like to wish Wilkie all the very best in his new job which he started on June 1st.

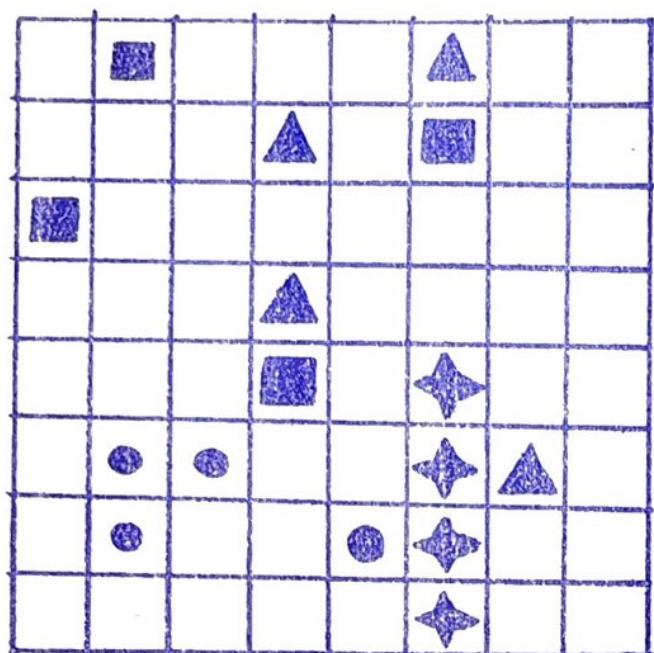

In the early stages Institute kept the run rate under control and Cresswell bowled with aggression and accuracy on a pitch that gave the bowler some encouragement. Higgins took a good catch behind the wickets with score on six. After 15 overs the score was only 38 but then Ledger started to open out. It was difficult to bowl at this batsman as he obviously knew more than a little about the art of hitting a cricket ball. In the last ten overs St. Margarets scored almost another 70 runs. This could have been even more but for some excellent fielding by Robinson who was very active in the covers.

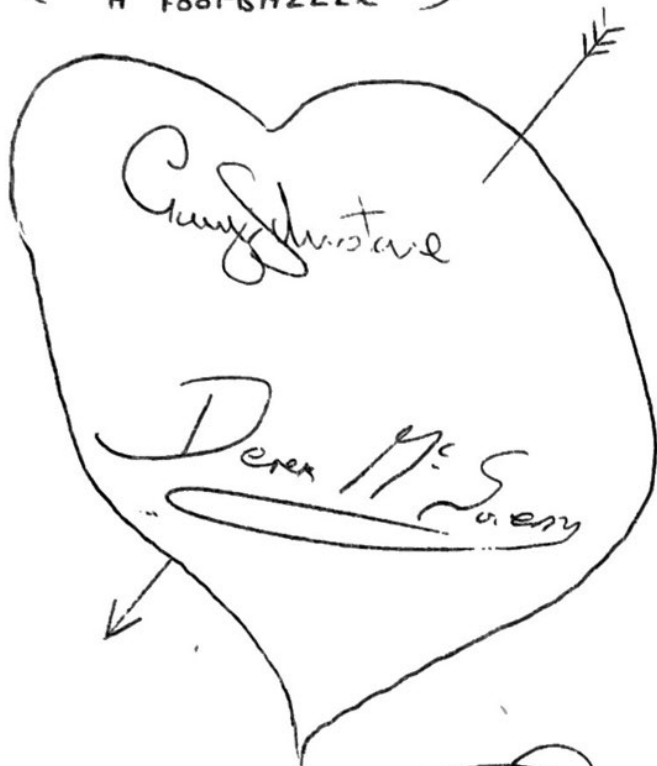
