

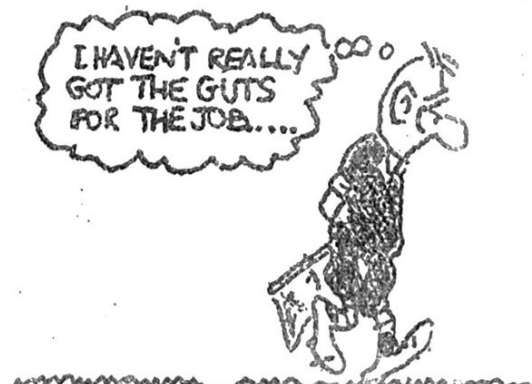

HALEWOOD + CHELLEW STAR IN FINE VICTORY. GOOD ALL ROUND TEAM PERFORMANCE WINS TWO POINTS.

Institute 4 West Derby 1 Diab 2 Hamilton Chellew.

By playing together and covering well for team mates Institute were good value for their 4-1 win at Mersey Road on Saturday. After just 5 minutes West Derby were presented with a 'gift goal' when a corner kick curled into the goalmouth and the ball eventually ended up in the back of the net. However, this did not deter the Institute and it was obvious that the team were going to get back into the game because of the determination they showed when going to win the ball. Chellew was playing very well, mainly in midfield, but he was showing up all over the pitch with powerful play. West Derby were employing an offside plan, but at times not very successfully. On one such occasion Bennett went close with a cracking shot that the goalkeeper saved very well. Soon after O'shaughnessy pushed the ball to Hamilton who



was onside. Hamilton looked up and seeing the goalkeeper off his line, chipped the ball over his head for an excellent goal. Shortly after Diable should have scored when a similar opportunity came his way. His shot was more of a threat to passing trains than the West Derby goalkeeper. Freckleton had a good first half keeping the right flank under control, managing to 'plough' his way through the many mushrooms growing down the wing.

The second half started well with Chelley forcing his way through into scoring positions. It was obvious a goal was going to come from Chelley very soon. Regan was denied a goal by an excellent save from the West Derby goalkeeper. After 9 minutes Institute took the lead. Diable seemed to have missed a golden opportunity to score but the goalkeeper gave him a second chance and Diable made no mistake in hitting the back of the net. Johnson and O'shaughnessy were heading the ball well from long West Derby clearances but after 15 minutes the long awaited moment came with Chelley's goal.

CHELLEY SCORES HIS GOAL.

A pass from O'shaughnessy started the move. Bennett made progress down the right and centred. Chelley found himself a little space and made no mistake from ten yards. Both sides were tending to push and tackle awkwardly but in an effort to keep play moving the whistle was used as little as possible. West Derby fell into the trap of 'mouthing' instead of getting on with the game. Diable now scored his second when he slipped the ball past the goalkeeper with the minimum of fuss. Naughton made some good saves in the last quarter of the game but at no time did West Derby look like getting back into this game. A lot of credit for this must be given to Joey Halewood who was outstanding in defence 'sweeping up' and bringing the ball out of danger and setting up many attacks. Full credit also to Johnson and O'shaughnessy who blocked the middle well while Phair and Freckleton played in their positions and did very well. On one occasion Freckleton beat four men in the course of a run from deep defence to the middle of West Derby's half. Warburton played the last ten minutes but had little chance to 'shine'. The most pleasing thing about this win was the way the side read the situation and played accordingly.

FIGHTING COMEBACK BY 1st YEARS

BROWN OUTSTANDING IN MIDFIELD

Institute 6 St. Teresas 3

Right from the kick off Institute dominated play and after ten minutes they had taken a convincing 3-0 lead. Brown was having a fine game in midfield and he was well supported by Eyo, Perischine and Gibilru. Some of the attacks down the left flank left the St Teresas defence in a shambles and even though the opposition reduced the arrears a fourth goal gave Institute an almost unassailable lead. However in the second half things began to go wrong. Our midfield players faded for a period of 20 minutes and St Teresas picked themselves up and challenged hard for the equaliser. It was in this period that Institute's defence looked very shaky, failing to clear the ball from danger and not marking opponents closely enough. Brian Peters who had played very well in the first half made one or two errors but full credit must be given to the team for 'playing through' this bad spell. Peters regained his authority and two further goals left St Teresas with a three goal deficit. Towards the end Perischine regained his first half form 'buzzing' in attack and causing many problems to the visiting side. Gibilru packed a lot of skill into his small size and with this midfield promise it looks as though a very useful side will develop.

The first half was very competitive with both teams playing some good football but West Derby had the edge. They managed to break down the 2nd XI defence several times but their shooting was weak and usually at WILKINSON.

A defensive error lead to their first goal, from a corner the ball was headed away to a West Derby player who hit the ball across the area, the 2nd XI defence stood still expecting the referee to blow for offside, he did not, and a West Derby forward ran through and slotted the ball into the back of the net. The 2nd XI also had chances in the first half, very good chances but most of the shots went wide.

In the second half the 2nd XI started to play the better football but still lacked at the back with many errors being made. NORBURY soon cleared away the errors and became a dominant figure in the defence. Another mishap in the 2nd XI defence lead to West Derbys second goal which the forward took well. With about 30 minutes to go the 2nd XI became dominant. Still many "open goal" chances were missed. With 6 minutes to go the 2nd XI pulled one back when LONG powerfully headed a CAVANAGH cross in. 2 minutes later CAVANAGH weaved his way to the line pulled it back to LONG who hammered it home.
