LANGFORD INSPIRES TEAM TO 1st WIN IN SIX GAMES.

SECOND YEARS THRASH PRESCOT.

The second year team produced their best form of the season on Saturday and except for a short period either side of half time Prescott were never in the game. Jones opened the scoring after 7 minutes taking advantage of a mix up between a Prescott defender and the goalkeeper, the type of goal we usually concede. Flanagan beat 2 opponents on the edge of the area but his shot was well saved. After 13 minutes Bailey made it 2-0 with a long range effort that dipped just under the bar, 2 minutes later Dudley scored his first goal for the team when following a run down the left wing he beat his man and scored with a tremendous shot from near the corner flag. Prescott had no answer to Institute's brilliant attacking play and only several excellent saves by the goalkeeper kept the score down. After 20 minutes it was 4-0 when Bailey gave Flanagan a chance and he made no mistake. Five minutes before half time Parry scored number 5 when Long's effort rebounded from the post. Institute then relaxed their grip on the match and just before the interval Prescott pulled a goal back.
