THE BEST SEASON YET - ~~NO~~ NO LEAGUE DEFEATS.

TWO DISAPPOINTMENTS: CUP DEFEAT; BROKEN LEG FOR WOODS.

The statistics show that this was an excellent season for the Third Years, possibly even better than the cup-winning season two years ago. Not to say that everything went smoothly. Far from it, as several things did their best to make the season difficult at times. We started off by suffering from the bus-strike, which meant the cancellation of several games, and our first victory, against West Derby, was all the more meritorious as some of the lads had not seen each other for two or three weeks. Then we had a bruising match against an uncompromising Bridgefield team, ending up with 10 men after Derbyshire had been hacked down. This game was remarkable for a goal by Harper from the half-way line! Then, quite unexplicably, we lost in the Cup to Croxteth on a mud-heap (1-0). This was the first time the team has not scored in a match. Having overcome this disappointment, we had possibly our hardest match against Salesians, coming out on top 2-1.

We travelled to New Heys, expecting a hard match, and it was here that Woods had the misfortune to break his leg when he was playing well. He is just about to have the plaster removed and we all hope that he will be playing again in the future. Despite having only 10 men, we could easily have scored five instead of only drawing 2-2.

After the bus-strike, came the Winter which forced the cancellation of a few matches, but our teams played on when others did not: events proved that if players behave sensibly, you can play on difficult circumstances. On one of these dubious days, ~~Lawlor~~ Lawlor turned in the performance of the season when scoring 7 against Halewood - most of them were well-worked goals, not gifts. The next match contained what I thought was our best football of the season - a convincing 6-0 victory at S.F.X. Everything seemed to go right, everyone ran for each other, with clever one-twos, flowing movements from the half-way line and excellent dribbling skills.

Then came the return with New Heys, who are Echo Cup semi-finalists. To put it mildly, New Heys have a hard approach and we did very well to defeat them with a slightly understrength team, Mitchell and Harper dominating their respective parts of the field. The season ended on a farcical note as the team slammed Quarry in a torrential downpour - but at least the match enabled us to reach the magic target of 100 goals.

The team has matured into a fine cohesive unit this year, as the understanding gained over the last three years has blossomed. Like all successful sides, the lads have developed into a team, playing for each other now instead of individually. Of course, there are outstanding individuals, and I think it is fair to say that there is not a better player for his age in Liverpool than Mitchell, who, as well as creating chances for others from midfield, has managed to score 31 goals. The statistics show, however, that the defence has been the basis of our success. Harper has had an outstanding season, blocking the middle time after time - as well as being dangerous at corners. Foulkes has improved out of all recognition and Holden has proved to be a cultured sweeper when the others were beaten. Derbyshire, also, has grown in confidence at left-back. The goalkeeping has been shared by Wiggins (who needs a few extra inches in height) and latterly Kane (who made an excellent back-breaking save against Quarry).

Manifold has been his usual efficient self, and he has now been joined in midfield by ex-sweeper Jarman who has added power to the tackling and also some devastating shooting. Lawlor is not the biggest centre-forward in the world, but if the ball is played in low, he can turn any defender. Maddock has been very impressive in his first season, both as a scorer and also a barrier of defenders. Conneely has shown excellent close control and centring, although he still drifts out of the game at times. Virtue has proved to be a loyal and useful sub. Ellison has also performed skilfully when called upon.

In lovely weather on a makeshift pitch the 'super tests' continued with a fine game that ended just in favour for Jamieson's XI. After 15 minutes Johnson hit the post with a snap shot and the play was fast and sharp. Flanagan missed a good chance to open the scoring but was thwarted by Long in goal. Lintott came into the game at the other end by making a great save but he should have had no chance when McLoughlin broke clear and missed a 'sitter'. As if this was not bad enough, He again worked the ball into a fine scoring position before putting the resulting shot a couple of feet on the wrong side of the post. Eyo had 'stirred' his team throughout the first half but Jamieson's XI had looked the sharper team. At half time the score was 0-0.

The 2nd half started with a lot of pressure from Jamieson's XI and Flanagan was forcing himself more into the game. JAMIESON'S XI GO AHEAD 6 - 5 IN SUPER SERIES BUT THERE ARE MORE GAMES TO COME.

Although Jamieson's XI have taken a small lead in the super tests it has been decided that the series continues for at least another week. Therefore Eyos XI can gain revenge for the defeats they have suffered in the last few weeks. Remember they had a formidable lead around xmas time.

This was another fine game played in cool damp conditions. The pitch was like wembley turf and Eyo urged his team forward. They took the lead when McLoughlin (he has not retired from super test football after all) ran through and scored a very good goal easily beating Lintott. Flanagan proved that effort brings rewards when he equalised 5 minutes later. He was a little lucky to have a second chance but he made no mistake from 5 yards. As always it is difficult to field a decent side at the beginning of the season, and as we were virtually managers of ourselves, the organisation of a side against Q.BANK was not too easy. Only seven players could turn up, and as expected we were trounced by the terrible score of 9-2.

We did however manage to field a decent side on the following Saturday, and after being 0-2 down for most of the game, we fought back very strongly to make the game level at 2-2. If time would have been with us we probably could have scored 6! From then on the results went extremely well as we went 4 games without defeat. Everyone knew we were in for a tough game when we were to face Salesian, and it came as a surprise when we found ourselves 2-1 up in the first half. At this point in the season we had not found a strong enough midfield trio, and Salesian exploited this by forging forward to score three quick goals to end up as 4-2 victors. It may have seemed to some, and especially to certain 1st XI people, that the 2ND XI bubble had burst, when, for some strange reason, we experienced two more defeats on the trot, to the teams of St. Augustine and New Heys.

We did overcome these defeats by going out to thrash Prescott. The score was 0-2, but the Prescott side was no match for the full strength Prescott side which we met in the Invitation cup, a little later on in the season.

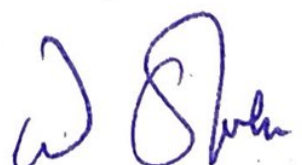
