YARWOOD SCORES TWO GREAT GOALS TO SEAL FINE VICTORY

PARTINGTON WORKS HARD THROUGHOUT THE GAME

Hillfoot 3 Institute 4 Yarwood 2 Fearn 2

A large crowd of at least fifteen saw the First year team achieve a fine victory over Hillfoot last week. The start of the game was a little scrappy but after 10 minutes both sides settled down and played some good football. In the 8th minute Hillfoot should have scored when the Institute defence held off their tackle and gave the home team far too much time. This was to be the major criticism of Institute - a slight hesitation in defence. At the other end Yarwood produced a good left wing run and his centre was almost converted by Hutchin. Partington was really 'buzzing' in midfield but the obvious attacking danger was coming from Yarwood who was showing strength in his running with the ball and his centres. To show that it was not all concentrated on the left Chin went on a determined run on the right wing but the attack broke down in the penalty area. Hillfoot now missed a golden opportunity to take the lead when the ball was somewhat luckily blocked on the Institute goal line. Partington came to the rescue in defence with some clever football and minutes later Swinnerton pressurised the opposing attack and forced them into error.

Mills made a good save when a high shot was sent into his goalmouth and then the action switched to the other end when Fearn tried a 'lob shot' that was just saved by the Hillfoot goalkeeper. Fearn now 'blotted his copybook' by taking far too much time on the ball after another fine Yarwood cross.

After 15 minutes Partington bundled into an opponent and Mills was given no chance with the penalty kick. Partington set up another chance after a determined run but we were suffering a lack of 'killer' finish and an almighty scramble saw the ball cleared to safety. Institute equalised in the 20th minute when Reynard put the ball out to Yarwood on the left wing. His long centre was converted by Fearn. Reynard almost scored a 2nd goal but his shot passed over the bar owing to an awkward bounce right at the moment of impact. Institute were now really coming into the game and they took the lead when Reynard crossed and Fearn headed the ball home. Just before half time we missed several good chances to take a commanding lead but at the interval there was just one goal separating the teams.

The 2nd half started with Institute attacking hard and after a glancing header from Fearn's Yarwood sent in a deadly corner. The ball was cleared but shortly after Yarwood produced the moment of the match.

YARWOOD'S 50 YARD RUN.

Yarwood collected the ball just inside his own half and set off for goal. He shrugged off a tackle and drew the goalkeeper out of his goal. He finished off with a beautiful shot that 'rocketed' into the back of the net. Ford was coming into play now and he showed some intelligent touches, creating several openings for his team mates. It appeared that Hillfoot were finished but a terrible lapse in defence allowed them to come back into the game. Their forwards strolled right down the middle of the pitch and no-one put in a tackle. 5 minutes later Yarwood again produced a 'magic' moment. He won the ball just in the opponents half and ran at the defence. Another lethal shot gave the goalkeeper no chance whatsoever. But again Institute allowed Hillfoot to recover, Ramsey held off from a tackle and the score became 3-4. The last minutes were 'nail biting' as the referee added a good 5 minutes for non existant stoppages. Ford showed some real skill down the left and seconds later Hutchin sent a powerful shot crashing against the crossbar. Yarwood should have completed his hat-trick in the last minute but the game ended with a fine scoreline for an enthusiastic Institute team. Reynard proved a steady player and Partington and Yarwood linked well together. Ramsey has an accurate left foot kick in defence and if the defence can get their tackles in a little quicker the results should improve from week to week.
