Another fine all round team display earned Institute a great win at West Derby. In the first few minutes they were unlucky not to be two goals up but the first goal was well worth waiting for. It came after 5 minutes and really was a fantastic effort. The ball was played out of defence by Peters and passed on by Brown to Perischine on the right. His cross was volleyed into the corner of the net in grand style by Brown. With skill and determination Institute went three goals up through Gibilru and Partington, indeed Partington had a fourth goal ruled offside. Brown now hit the bar with a great effort and Perischine, Eyo, Gibilru and Eme all came very close to scoring. The first half was totally one way 'traffic'. Brown, enjoying his best game of the season, hit the crossbar for the second time and then had another goal disallowed. As the minutes went by more and more chances went 'begging' and the ball would not 'go over' the West Derby line. As so often happens tremendous pressure is rewarded by a setback. From a West Derby break the Institute lead was reduced. West Derby threatened with some long range shots but Calvin dealt with them comfortably. Peters was having a great game on his return after injury and along with the rest of the defence restarted the Institute 'machine' moving forward again. Eyo scored a fourth goal with a close range shot. Perischine almost scored number 5 but he miskicked from only 8 yards. The game ended as it had begun with Institute in complete control. Had the scoreline read fifteen - one it would have been no more than we deserved.

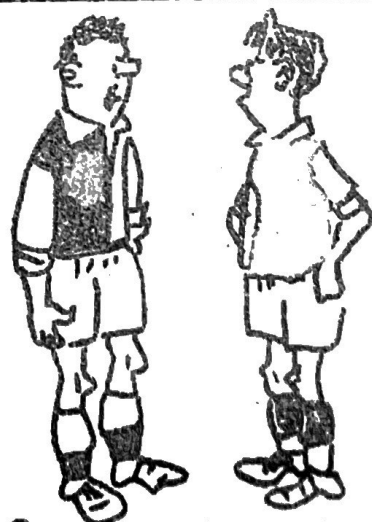

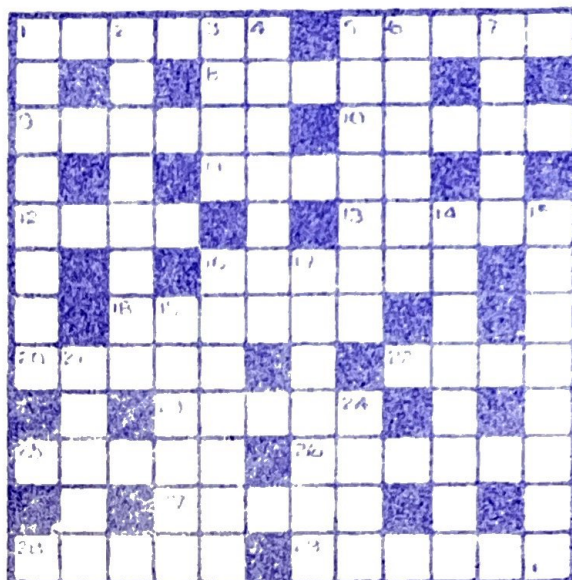
