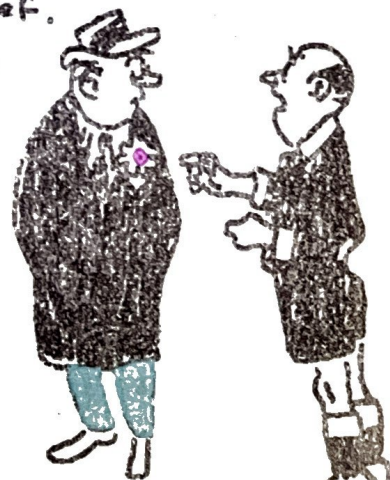

Spot the ball.

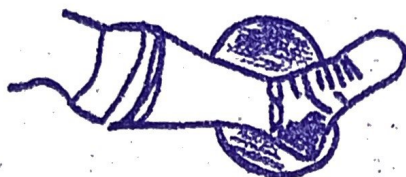
I have not the space to draw the complete picture of where the ball was but here is the vital bit. The complete picture can be seen in room 33.

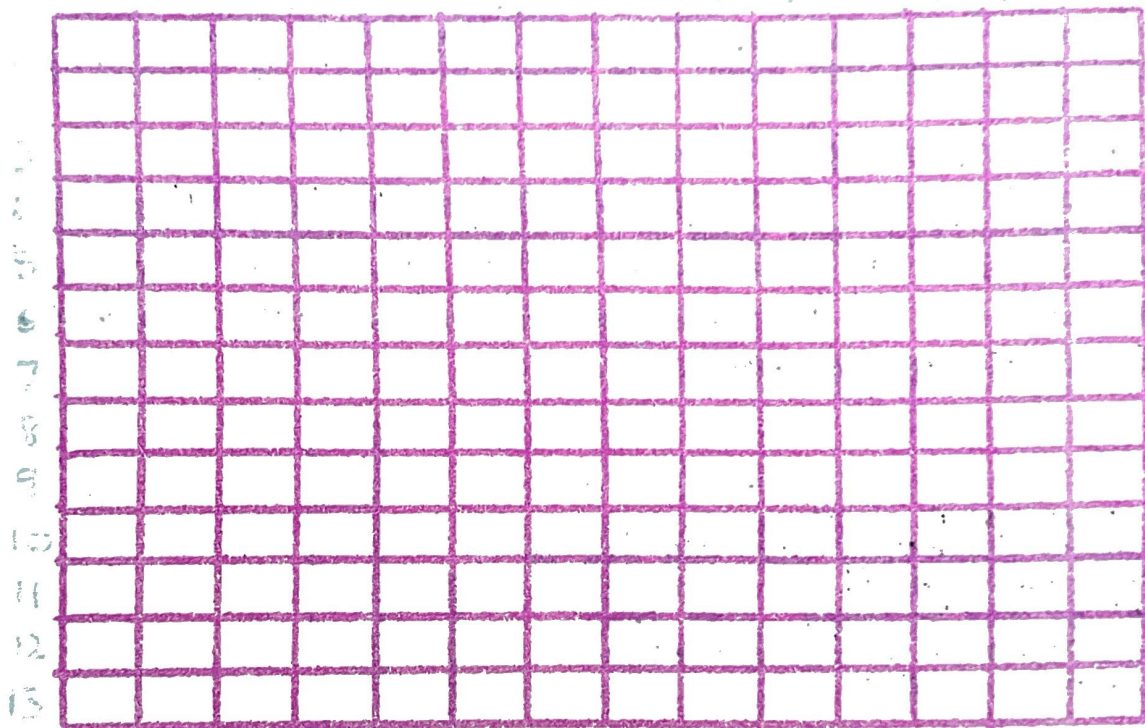

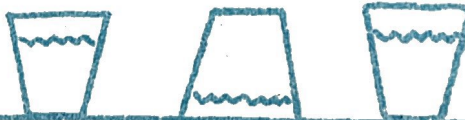
