On arrival at the ground several problems had to be solved. Firstly the Institute bus was 40 minutes adrift, secondly tactics would have to take into consideration the cold, very wet conditions and thirdly the A team only had 9 players. Iwédiebo was promoted into the A team and now the action could start.

The first player to 'shine' was Aubee who played some nice touches in midfield and it was not long before Institute began to press forward. O'mara took a throw in and Johnson cleverly headed the ball on to Smith who unfortunately missed with his final shot. From the resulting corner the ball was cleared off the line but minutes later Inst. were back in the St Augustine penalty area when Johnson sent in an intelligent 'lob' that Baker almost converted. When the home team did break Hassell covered well, on one occasion after he had hesitated a moment he recovered and passed back to Richardson. Baker broke clear down the left flank and created a terrible 'mix up' in the goalmouth. Three minutes later another doubtful offside break allowed Inst. to take a two goal lead. Johnson flicked the ball on to Smith who scored his goal even though it looked as if he had initially missed his chance. Almost immediately we gave away a 'soft' goal to allow St Augustine back into the game. Smith was indeed a fortunate forward at this point in the game for Johnson was feeding him some great passes down the right wing. Mason and Hassell tackled and won the ball with ease in defence and again the action returned to the other end. Barker forced his way into the penalty area with a fine run before Scanlon scored with a hard shot that the goalkeeper could not hold. This goal was again scored from a possible offside position but goals are goals and 3-1 was a fair reflection of the play. O'mara and Baker again were in the thick of the action but at this stage the defence were a little hesitant and Richardson was called into the action. A throw from Smith was flicked on by Johnson and this was followed by two strong efforts by Baker and O'mara. On occasions the ball was 'sticking' in puddles and this caused some moves to break down. The home goalie denied Smith his hat trick with a good save. Sillitoe cleared his line and saved the team on one occasion but another 'soft' goal saw St Augustine pull back to 2-3. Just before the interval Aubee went on a long powerful run and Johnson missed a golden chance to score.

The 2nd half started with accompanying thunder, hail and a warning from the Gods? Aubee went on another run, this one a brilliant effort Johnson missed another great chance, a pity because his approach work was of the highest class. 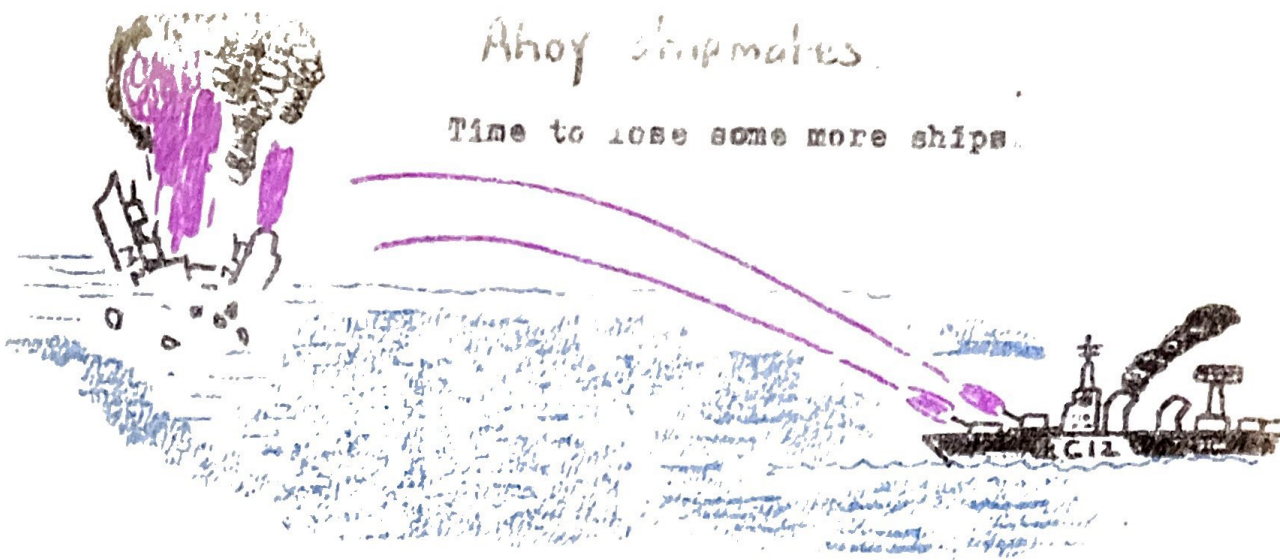

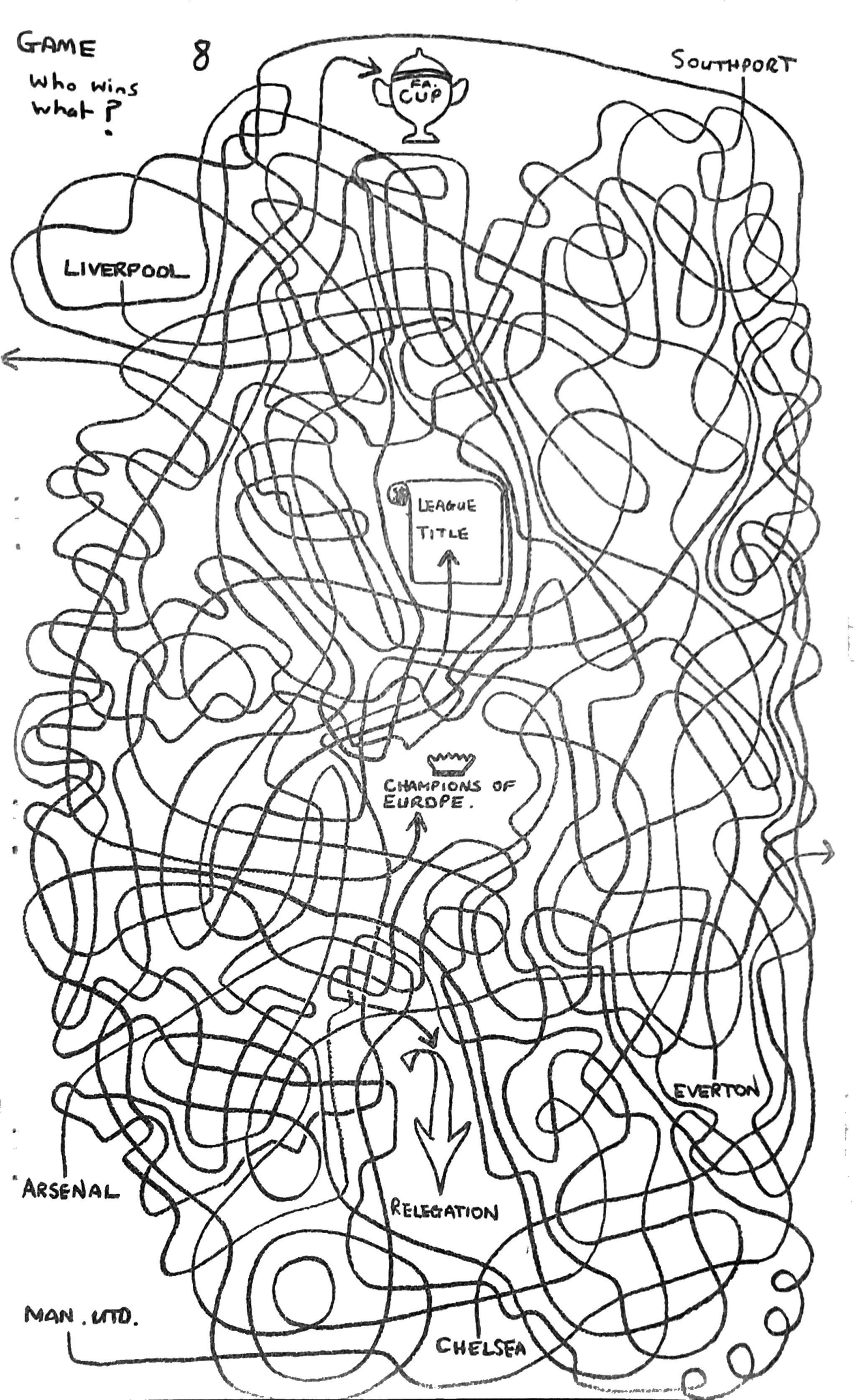
