LAPSES IN CONCENTRATION AND FEW 'BREAKS' RESULT IN HEAVIER DEFEAT THAN INST. DESERVE. JOHNSON SCORES LATE GOAL. Salesian 8 Inst. 1

The 3rd year B team suffered their first defeat on Saturday but the scoreline was not a true reflection of the ability of the team.

Salesian must have thought it was Christmas, so many 'gifts' were bestowed on them and they made no mistake with their finishing. If one subtracts the 5 'silly' goals we presented them a more realistic score is seen.

In the very first minute Institute presented Salesian with the perfect opening. Slack defensive work allowed them far too much time and a goal resulted. For the next 15 minutes Institute controlled the game with Johnson showing some nice touches and Dove 'buzzing' all over the pitch. Hassell made a fine interception and on one occasion Smith made a strong run down the right wing. Just as it was looking as if we must score an indecisive moment between Hassell and Richardson gave away another 'gift' goal. Aube made a powerful run but on occasions our defence was looking very slow and flatfooted. Too many times the defenders were 'watching' the opposition instead of getting stuck in and dispossessing them.

Johnson again produced a neat little 'dribble' and Smith followed suit. Dove tried a snap shot that was not far wide. Smith beat his full back and sent over a long dangerous centre.

Johnson was just not tall enough and his header passed narrowly over the bar. This was a fine move. Hassell was playing well in defence but once again a lapse in concentration gave Salesian an opening. Two more goals just before half time were a poor reward for some hard effort. However, it

FLANAGAN SCORES HIS 86th GOAL IN FINE WIN.

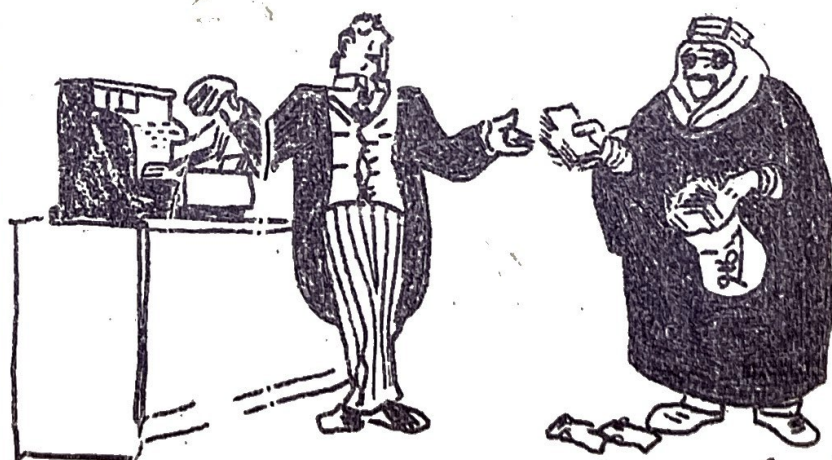
West Derby 0 Institute 1

This is an impressive record and the whole team is to be congratulated.

Over the next few editions I shall include all the statistics for all the school teams.

In 1967 much to my disgust the carrier I was serving on by passed that hot spot Mombassa and diverted to Aden. The port of Aden, annexed by Britain in 1839, was the first territorial gain of the Victorian era. Dominated by the arid red cliffs of an extinct volcano, its sparse population was reported to be in a 'condition' of most indigent poverty and neglect. Aden had neither wealth nor beauty, but it did possess a fine harbour which provided anchorage for ships en route to imperial India. The Raj ended in 1947 but Aden's value as a military base increased as the turbulent tide of Arab nationalism swept British forces out of Egypt, Iraq and

Jordan. By the 1950's the same tide was stirring Aden. By 1964 Britain faced a bloody terrorist campaign waged with lavish supplies of soviet arms.

After several years of struggle against the terrorists the British Government announced that it would grant independence to the Federation by 1968. We would then abandon the base for good. However the rival groups in Aden were determined to gain 'freedom' sooner. Blood was shed between rival groups and the British.

On one side stood the Egyptian backed Front for the liberation of South Yemem. (FLOSY). On the other was ranged the fanatically Marxist National Liberation Front. (NLF) In between was the British soldier. Women and children were fair game for the terrorist bullets and bombs and senior government officials were warned that they would be shot one by one like dogs.

Rioting and arson, accompanied the shooting and bombing, and schools churches and synagogues went up in flames. Unwilling to spend more lives for the privilege of being an imperialistic Aunt Sally Britain announced that withdrawal day was to be rushed forward.

When I arrived I did not know what to make of the 'mess'. Aden is an awe inspiring place- an almost lunar landscape. No trees, grass or vegetation at all. Hot and very dusty. My job at first was manning a radio link on the carrier but some berk decided that we would be better employed manning an air traffic control link ashore. Flying ashore gave me mixed feelings. On one hand I was glad to get off the ship, but on the other hand unfriendly arabs were poor company. I can remember acquiring an old smelly mattress that gave me a most comfortable bed in the corner of a dirty hot shack just on the perimeter of the airstrip. At least 5 locals were fighting over who should have my 'bed' if anything may happen. If I had known that then I would have gladly given it over to them. I suppose it was a little like the situation in Northern Ireland today. You just did not know who was friendly or hostile. When trouble did brew the unfortunate victim rarely knew anything about it. I know I found sleep difficult at first. After a while though you accept your 'lot' and the rat race continues.

The British withdrawal was a sombre and unpleasant affair. Instead of cheering crowds, the streets of Aden, with shuttered shops, echoed only to the roar of armoured cars and the whine and rattle of rooftop gun battles between rival political factors. I was glad to jump on a helicopter and get out. Landing on board the carrier was very welcome. The last hours in Aden were frustrating. There was no way we could airlift all our stores out. Therefore we were given orders to destroy anything left behind. Tons of great gear had to be destroyed. Typewriters, fridges, air conditioning units, even juke boxes were smashed up or dumped in the harbour. Land rovers, lorries had their gumps opened and oil drained. They were then run until the engines seized up - with a horrible grinding burning smashing sound. Thousands of books were burnt and it all seemed a terrible waste.

I flogged my mattress for a couple of quid to a local. The last few days in the province saw much off the record boozing as all the stores of alcohol were 'poured away' you can guess where. You won't find that in history-books.

Once on board Albion the ship made rapid progress to Singapore where a long stay in dry dock gave me plenty of time to 'catch up on lost time'.

Well that is enough rambling from me for now.

I am now going to work on a new game for all readers of Footie News to join in. This is sure to hurt my brain but I'll come up with something. Poor old Everton. Once again they are doomed to be the poor relative of the greatest team in Europe. Liverpool F.C.

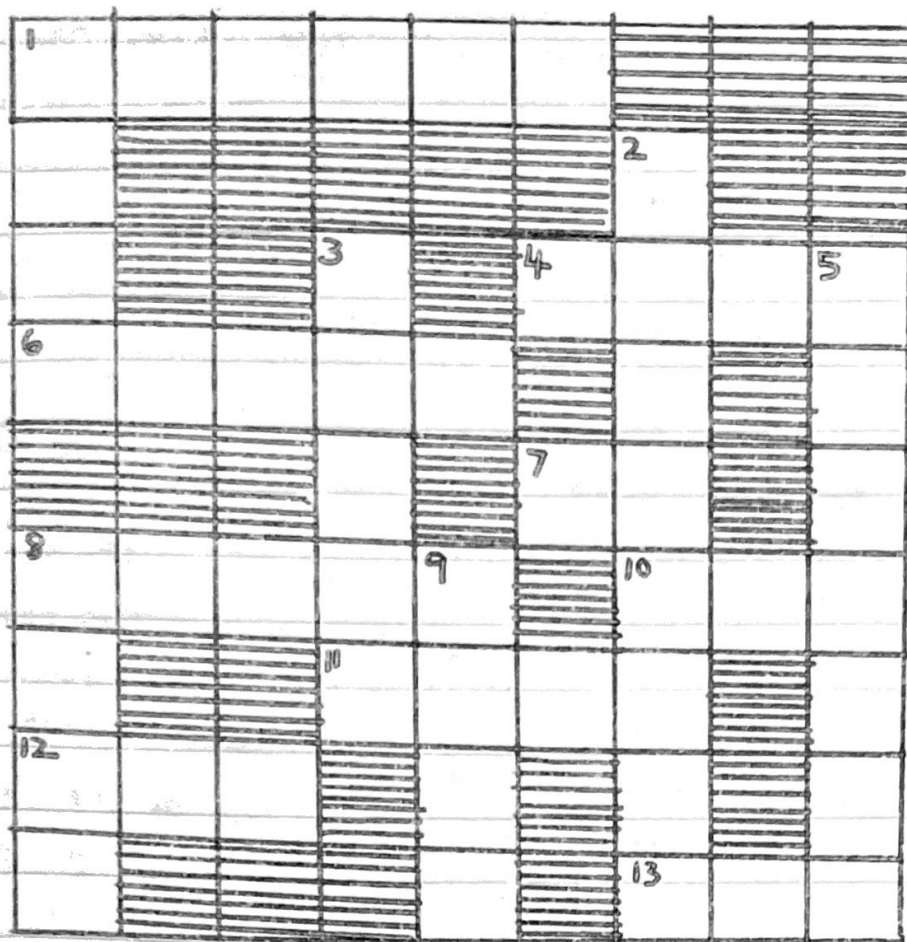

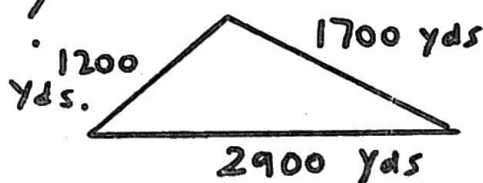
