TYSON EXCELS IN MUD AT HILLFOOT FAWCETT AND KNOWLES HAVE GREAT GAMES.

Hillfoot 3 Institute 1st year B 8 Tyson 3 Knowles 2.
Lightfoot 2 Fawcett.

This was an excellent team performance in very muddy conditions at Hillfoot. Indeed the right wing was more like a swampy bog and how Lightfoot managed to remain 'above the surface' sometimes amazed me. Man of the match was George Tyson who chased everything, scored a hat trick and was constantly a menace to the Hillfoot defence. The situation did not look bright at the start of the game as Hillfoot went into a two goal lead. With Mr Williams giving support Institute fought back strongly. A scrambled goal in the mud was credited to Lightfoot and Fawcett and George Tyson added their names to the goalscorers. The best goal of the half was scored by KNOWLES who headed home strongly from a centre by Ramsey. All through the first half Fawcett had shown much skill in the middle of the field and with great determination from Tyson and good passing by Knowles things looked good for the second half. The 'crowd' sneaked over from the adjoining pitch (Mr Cooke) and the action restarted. Knowles broke clear through the middle and took his chance very well to make the score 5-2. He continued to impress but so to did Savage in goal at the other end. He made a fine save to deny Hillfoot a goal. Crompton went on a long run but was prevented from scoring by a grand save from the Hillfoot goalkeeper. Our next goal was a grand move. Tyson laid the ball off to Lightfoot who played a one two and passed back to Tyson. He made no mistake and Hillfoot were now in real trouble. Hillfoot scored a very good goal to make it 6-3, this came from a break away and Savage had no chance. Lightfoot was 'ploughing' through the mud and from his pass Ramsey shot just inches wide. Marsh now replaced Lappin and took up position on the left side of midfield. Fawcett broke through and after splendid approach work 'muffed' his chance. Fortunately Tyson was on hand to bang the ball home. 7-3. Tyson followed this immediately with some brilliant play, however he spoilt it all by overdoing it a little and losing his chance to score. Knowles 'cracked' a shot against the crossbar and immediately from the break Savage saved well. Lightfoot and Tyson again linked and it was the former who finished

This was a really fine victory over St Margarets and the team showed real character in the way they fought back after the disappointment of going 1-2 down after a good opening goal from Flanagan (sorry I'll try again) Flanagan. The opening exchanges were even and both sides played good football on the very heavy pitch. St Margarets had a skillful forward who tested Bailey, playing at right back in the absence of Wright. Institute opened the scoring with a typical goal from Brian Flanagan. He moved forward with the ball and got his shot in

from 12 yards. Even though he did not connect properly the ball still crossed the line. St Margarets hit back hard and slack marking allowed them to equalise. 5 minutes later St Margarets hit the post with a firm shot and the ball rebounded into danger area. 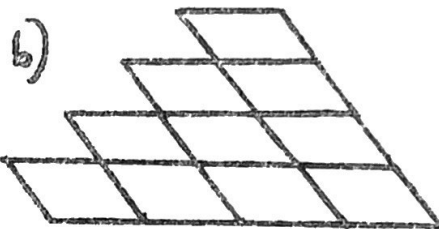

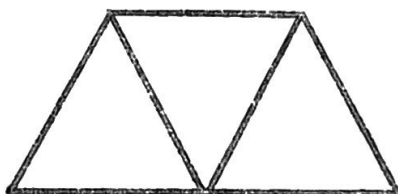

John HARPER (4A) Centre-half. 19 appearances.

A giant in defence - he was 6ft. in the First Year! Our impressive defensive records testify to his skill and I think it's fair to say no centre-forward has ever got the better of him. I still remember the goal he scored against Bridgfield direct from a free-kick, just inside his own half. Has rarely missed a match over 4 years. One of the dressing-room corners. **(9)**

Sweeper in first two years - now converted by brilliant manager into midfield. Industrious player with a powerful shot - I remember a 25-yarder against Raby. Seems afraid of getting his hair dirty by heading the ball! Has rarely missed a match over 4 years. Strong, quiet type! (8.5)

Tony LAWLOR (4A) Right-wing. 18 appearances. 6 goals.
