3RD YEAR 'B' "SWAMP" NETHERLEY IN FREAK WEATHER CONDITIONS. JOHNSON HAT-TRICK

Netherley 2 Institute 11 Johnson 3 O'mara 2 Lee 2

Leaving Liverpool in bright sunshine we moved into gloom and black cloud as Netherley was reached. Indeed the game kicked off in a snow storm on a very wet, muddy pitch. The Institute attack looked sharp with Johnson and O'mara linking well. Mason tackled well in defence. After 5 minutes Thompson went on a long run that brought Institute a corner. From the kick SMITH scored a direct goal. Now it was the turn of Eaves to break clear. However he was thwarted by a badly bouncing ball. A third break by Johnson ended with a tame shot from O'mara. Netherley came into the game with two breaks and first Richardson positioned himself very well to bring off his save then he came out well to make a brave save. Institute broke away yet again and Smith sent a shot against the crossbar. JOHNSON was on hand to tap home the rebound. This was a game of breaks and Institute were making the best of the chances. The third goal was a real gem. Iwediebo took a throw in and O'mara passed the ball on to Thompson. His centre was cracked home by means of a deadly JOHNSON volley. Eaves and Dove were really getting stuck in in midfield and after good approach work, a Johnson shot was cleared off the line. Roger Dove now broke right through the defence and slipped at just the last moment. O'mara was on hand to finish off the move. A good opportune goal. Richardson continued his fine form at the other end and Johnson was showing real class with some lovely 'lay offs'. Smith went on another of his skillful runs and Thompson nearly scored with a volley. Johnson ran right through the defence and at the last minute slipped the ball to Smith when everyone thought he would have shot himself. Smith was surprised to receive the ball and the chance was lost. Goal number five was another gem. Iwediebo, Johnson and Smith all played a part in the approach work. A hard centre was headed into the goal like a bullet from JOHNSON. Right on half time Netherley reduced the arrears.

At the start of the 2nd half the back four of Hassell, Sillitoe, Mason and Thompson continued their excellent play and from a great interception by Sillitoe the ball arrived at the long legs of Iwediebo. He made a right wing advance and sent in one of his long 'toe' shots that gave the goalkeeper no chance. Dove continued a long 'snaking' run before he took a return pass from O'mara. The goalkeeper blocked the final shot. Barry Lee came on for Smith. Thompson missed a real chance but O'mara made no mistake with the rebound. 7-1. Pimblett replaced Thompson just before Dove scored a 'cracker'. He hit a real DOVE scorcher from all of 30 yards. 8-1.

Pimblett sent a great ball through to Lee who was prevented from scoring by a fine goalkeeper save. Eaves, trying so hard to score failed just at the last moment after really determined play. Nevertheless Eaves contributed much in midfield and he can be well pleased with his form. Johnson hit the post with an open goal right in front of him. This came after good approach play from Eaves and O'mara. Johnson was obviously tiring in the heavy mud as the game moved towards it's conclusion. However Institute were not yet finished. Johnson failed by fatigue to convert number nine after a brilliant ball from O'mara. Eaves put Lee away with a superb pass and an equally great 'lay Off' by Lee was finished by a high shot from Pimblett that gave him a deserved goal. Netherley scored number two before Barry Lee scored with a hard shot. Lee was prevented from scoring one minute later by a crude foul after O'mara had pushed through yet another fine pass. Barry Lee was not discouraged and scored his second goal with the last kick of the game, a reward for really enthusiastic play.

Hassell led the side with real command and I must again mention the contribution of Sillitoe and Mason, great defenders.

FOOTBALL TREAT AT MERSEY ROAD. 3rd Yr B AND 2nd YEAR SHOW FOOTBALL SKILLS.

On the Thursday before the end of term a friendly challenge game between the 3rd year B team and the 2nd year illustrated all that is good in football. The game was played in a fine atmosphere and skill was the 'order of the day'. I found this game one of the most enjoyable games I have watched all season. The 2nd year scored the winner with the last kick of the game, something of a pity as 2-2 would have been a more than fair result.

Galvin was magnificent in the 2nd year goal saving his side time and time again as it looked as if the 3rd year were destined never to score.

Perischine, Eme and Eyo all showed real skill and Partington and Gibiliru gave all they had in effort and skill.

Mr Williams blew his whistle and the game started in perfect conditions on the small pitch at Mersey Road. This probably was of advantage to the 2nd year but it was the best surface to play on.

From an early break Gibiliru pushed a ball through the 3rd B defence and Eyo hit the post with a snap shot. The ball rebounded to

Partington who hit it back fiercely. RICHARDSON made a fantastic save. Again the 3rd year B defence was too hesitant and it was only another fine Richardson save that kept the scoreline blank. Now the action

moved to the other end and fine approach work from Johnson gave Smith a clear opening. Sadly he blasted the ball over from just four yards. Johnson was involved in some neat one two's but it was our leading

striker who was guilty of missing the final shot. Barry Lee took a great corner that Thompson met with a 'thundering' header. The ball

was not bound when a defender deflected it for a corner. Harding was sending telling passes over the pitch but Richardson was in

super form to deny them a goal. Again Johnson impressed with his laying off of the ball but these initial moves were not being

finished off with hard shots. The 2nd years should have taken the lead after Eyo crossed well but at the other end Smith came close

after some real determined play. RICHARDSON now made a fantastic save to prevent a goal and immediately pulled off another from a

hard Peters shot. Now came the moment of the game for me. Iwediebo pushed the ball out to Smith. He went on a long run with the ball

and sent over a superb centre. JOHNSON met the ball with a fierce volley that 'scorched' goalwards. Galvin stretched himself and

pulled off a 'wonder save'. The ball deflected onto the post and rolled right along the goal-line. From the resulting scramble and

a hot Galvin again saved superbly.

Half time saw a scoreline of 0-0 with promise of much to come.

Hassell now had to leave and to lose a defender as reliable as him was a blow. However Dove replaced him and added real fire to midfield.

The first goal of the evening was scored by Gibiliru. This was taken well but it was one of those goals that start from an offside position.

After the event everyone agreed to this but it was one of those decisions that the ref can never be sure of without a linesman doing

a proper job. After this Cookie put away his book and 'scorched up the line like a demon. The game was slightly spoilt now with a bad

injury to Johnson who was hurt in a tackle with Galvin in goal. Johnson broke his ankle and whilst he was being attended to the 2nd

year scored another goal. Partington was the scorer. Now the ten men had a real struggle on their hands and the game moved into another

phase. Barry Lee stormed down the left wing and from the resulting scramble the whites so nearly scored. O'mara turned expertly with

the ball minutes later and Galvin brought off a great save. Smith headed over the bar from a corner and with this pressure it was only

a matter of time before a goal must come. Iwediebo turned well with the ball and sent in a fine 'toed' cross shot. The ball evaded even the

alert Galvin. Minutes later Smith broke through and Galvin saved superbly when he came out from his goal. The action was really

'hotting' up as Iwediebo again broke down the right. He crossed the ball and Smith completely missed his chance. Not so Barry Lee who equalised

In the next five minutes the 3rd year could have scored four or five goals but Galvin saved his side time and time again. He denied O'mara

and Smith and after a brief excursion to the other end where Richardson saved well it was now Eaves who saw a grand effort saved by Galvin. From the resulting corner O'mara sent in a fine header but again Galvin saved the ball. With the last kick of the game the 2nd year scored through Partington. This was a good goal but it was a pity it divided two good teams.

Ratings seem pointless in this game but let me just add that both goalkeepers deserve ten. Richardson and Galvin.

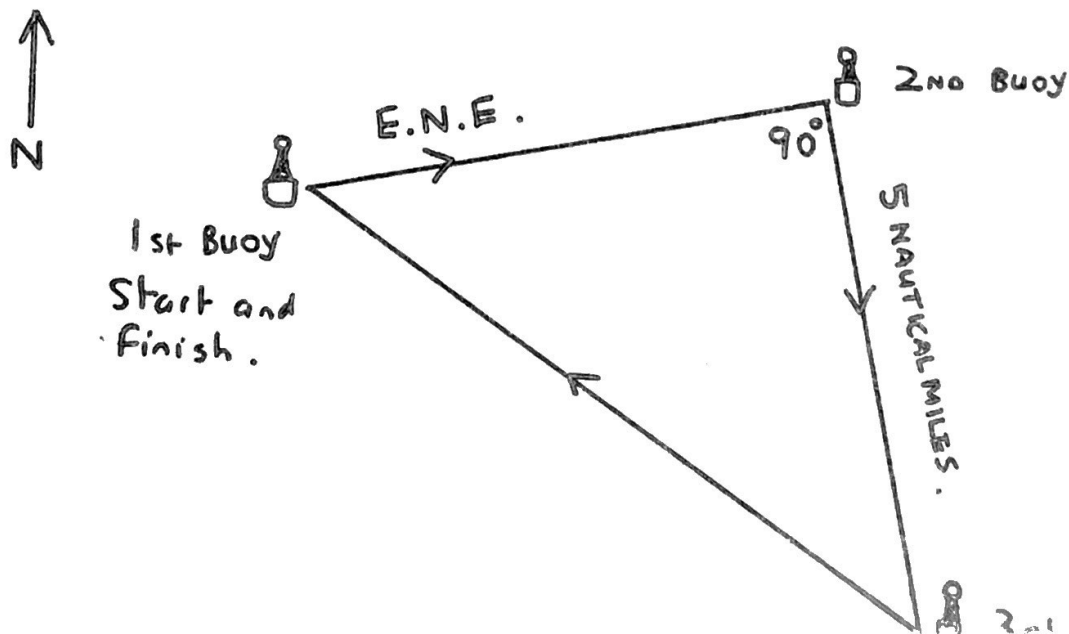

What are the courses (by the mariners compass) for the other two legs of the race.



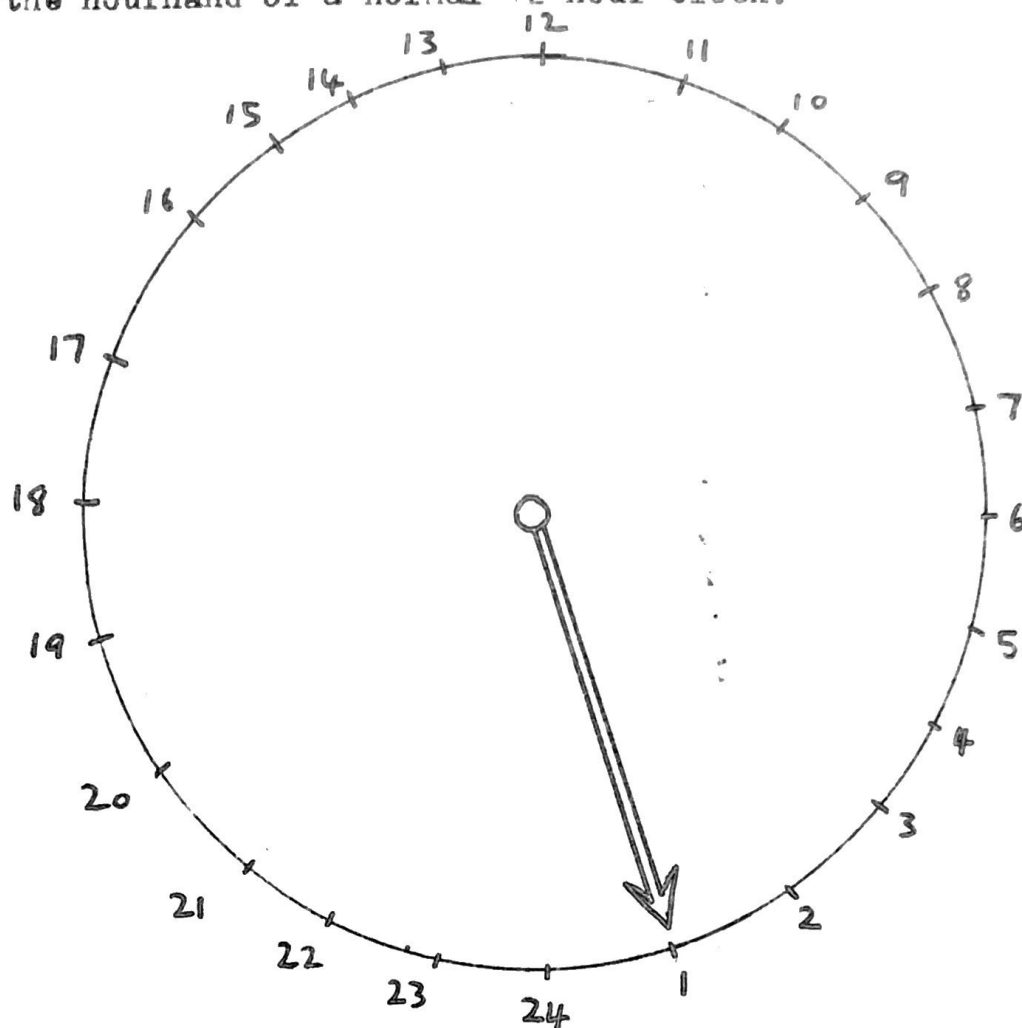
Game two.

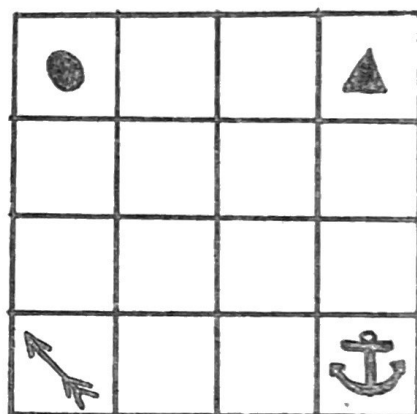

SECOND HALF GOALS DO NOT 'ARRIVE' AND

FIRST YEAR LOSE IN CUP FINAL.

Institute suffered a real blow when SFX took the lead in the first minute. It is possible that nerves were responsible for this goal but it was a real 'killer' blow. Nevertheless the team 'pulled themselves together' and by half time I felt they had more than a good chance of eventual victory.

The game was played in an Arctic wind on what I must report was a shocking pitch. In fact the game might better have been played on the beach. The surface was bumpy, bare in places and there were several long undulations across the pitch. Also Institute spent the 1st half kicking into the 'teeth of a gale'. Not the best setting for a cup final.

Ian Swinnerton cleared the ball well from a corner and Partington showed up well with some hard running and action play. Again it was Swinnerton who saved the defence and on one of the rare occasions we worked the ball into the SFX half Hutchin came close with a long shot. Warburton slipped up in defence but again Swinnerton was on hand to save the team. The ref spotted a foul in our goalmouth after a dangerous SFX corner. The game was not providing much action and both sides were finding it difficult to play football. At this stage Institute were doing really well and a scoreline of only 0-1 would have been a wonderful half time 'base' for victory.

SFX were awarded a free kick just outside our penalty area. With such a strong wind I felt the goal was almost inevitable. That is how it worked out. The ball 'screamed' into the net. Poor Mills had no chance. Warburton tried to dribble in the penalty box and this caused problems. Partington sent a great ball to Yarwood who broke clear. On this terrible pitch he could not control the ball and the chance was lost.

With just three minutes to go SFX scored number three after the defence held, off their tackle. This goal was a big pity for it left the team with a big 'mountain' to climb. However with a deadly striker like Yarwood in the attack all was not yet lost.

However in the first 10 minutes little real progress was made. We were not shooting enough although one long Yarwood shot brought a good save from the goalie. McPhee was replaced by Ford. Yarwood was trying desperately hard for his team but it was not really his day. This showed up when he put a corner wide. Just when a goal may have really brought Institute back into the game a 'golden chance' was missed. It was not really anybody's fault. The ball bounced all around the SFX goalmouth and no-one could get their foot to the ball.

SFX 'wrapped' the game up with a fourth goal and although Hutchin was still working hard the game had slipped away. He was just wide with a good header, this would have been a deserved goal for young Hutchin. Rimmer replaced Bohanna but just before the end SFX scored a fifth goal. This was a good goal from a header.
