Great save.

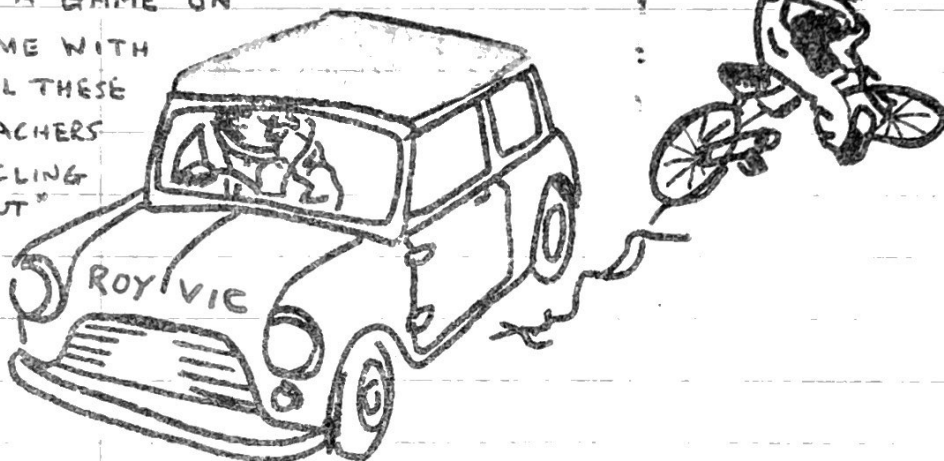

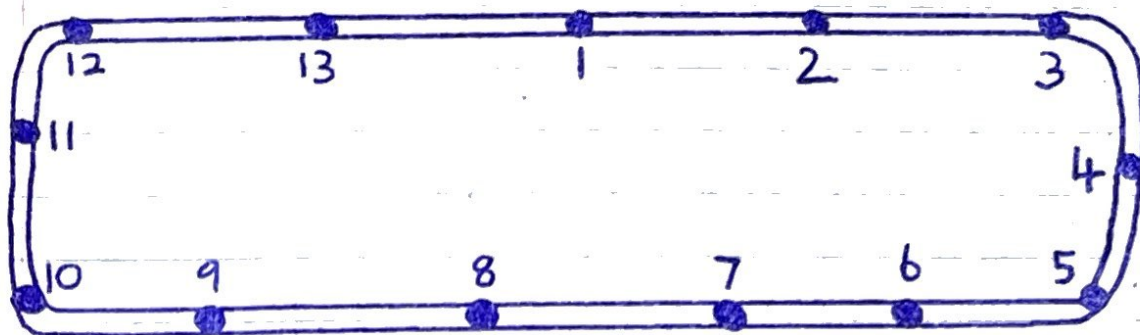

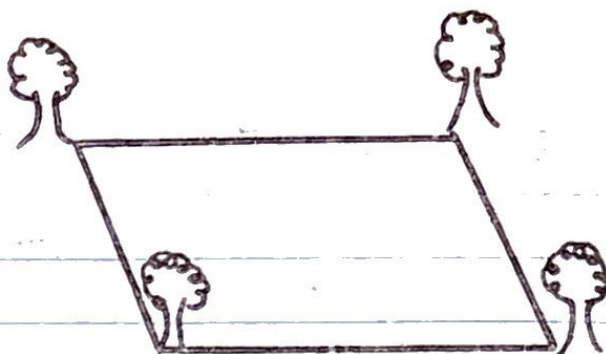
