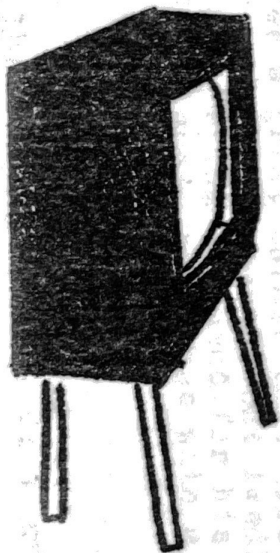
Half time 5-0.
