

John Alexander Chadwick, born in Liverpool in 1924, was educated at Liverpool Institute High School. He served with the Royal Signals during the war and later became a Programme Engineer with the British Forces Network in Humburg, controlling most of the orchestral concerts and music recordings. He is now studying for a B.Mus. degree, in his spare time, with Dr. Caleb E. Jarvis at the Liverpool Matthay School of Music.

The Coronation Murch "Let Youth Arise" was written at the request of the Liverpool Union of Girls and Mixed Clubs and for the Meracyside Youth Orchestra which gave its first performance at the Youth Clubs Festival held at St. George's Hall on May 2nd. It is also to be included in a broadcast programme by the Mersevside Youth Orchestra and Choir later this month.

The March, which is in the Elgar-Walton tradition, is in three main sections, the first and third of which are purely orchestra. The middle section in which the choir joins is a setting of the words:

The prolude is short, quiet and contains some lovely tunes which, played by various instruments, are interwoven to make a beautiful musical tapestry.

MODERN TRENDS IN THE TEACHING OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION

"Movement is the source of all life" wrute Leonards de Vinci in the 15th century. This power can only be fully developed through training and ample opportunity for activity and movement. The aims of physical education to-day are to form a bests for healthy living and the skill to erroy activities of windly divergent types.

The methods used to fulfi three aims base gradually changed churing the hast less desides and recently the Mussery of Education issued its heest publication on Physical Education entitled. Moving and Grosning, in which are significant the general vinneyles recommended as a basis for the training of the youth of this country. All efficient movement depends upon the right combination of these three elements.

Training on these lines is the basis of the work in the majority of Liverpool Infants and Girls schools to-day and it gives in what is commonly known as the icommonly known as the which, as it were children learn the grammar of movement. This grammar as it becomes known is a golden to diameter, twinming, games, adhelics so involving all of the proportion of the older girls.

The photographs serve to illustrate a few of the activities mentioned above, the two on this page showing a standard of poise and control which have been reached by fourteen year old girls who have mastered their powers of movement to a very high degree.

CROWING LIP TO MANHOOD

THIS brief explanation of what we are aiming at in the modern physical ductation lesson is addressed mainly to parents who have boys in Liverpool schools. As parents you will have a viral interest in your boy's health and well being. By following a few common sense rules and co-operating with what the school is trying to do for him you will ensure that when the time comes for him to leave school he will be well able to fend for him-self and face the many problems of earning a living with confidence and course.

Some of these rules are that he keeps himself really clean by the request better than the real server right, goes to bed in good rime (12 hours sleep up to 12 years old, 16 hours afterwards) and gets adequate and well balanced meals. When he comes to school, in order that he may reap the full behelts of facilities provided be should bring along a pair of shorts and plimsolls for the obsisced againing

lessons, a pair of swimming trunks and a pair of football boots and shirt as required.

It is the object of the school to give the child a general education and to bring about an all round and harmonious development of its faculties. This aim can only be realised if the education covers both the mental and the physical side of the child's nature. It is a commonly acknowledged law that mind and body are dependent on one another.

During the child's whool life the process of steady growth demands that a brick stream of blood be sent round to all the tissues of the body so that they may obtain the materials from which to grow. The only means of promotting the speed of the blood is by movement. Therefore, Nature has given every healthy child an almost unconquerable desire for movement. The more he is allowed to satisfy this desire for movement, the more assumal will be his development; the more in is hindred the mose his health will suffer; many proofs of the latter face can be found in large towns.

In the Primary School this need is met an far as is possible by a daily lesson in some kind of movement training These lessons will include simple temedial movements activities with small apparatus such as skipping ropes, hoops, small halls and bean bags, and the practice of techniques such as throwing, hitting, dribbling, running and leaping. They will also include opportunities for agility exercises on all sorts of apparatus where possible (see illustration). Swimming lessons, country dancing and organised pames will also be included in the scheme where facilities evier

In the Secondary School the work is more specialised and gymnastics provides the basic grammar of movement training. The main effect is to produce mobility, strength and agality in the various muscle groups so preparing the body to take part in activities such as Athletics, Swimming, Football, Cricket, Basket Ball, etc.

Through organised games the boys learn to subordinate themselves for the common good, to obey the rules of the game and the meaning of true sportsmanship.

This spirit of sporemarship is also fostered through the many interschool competitions organised so generously in out of school hours by the School teachees in Liverpool. It will mean a lot to your boy if you as a parent help him with your interest and Geoperations.
